Kristalina Georgieva, CEO, World Bank Co-chair of the Women Leaders Global Forum

When I joined the World Bank in the early 1990s, women were few and far between and it was to the detriment by the institution. The World Bank President at that time, Jim Wolfensohn, once said to me, 'Kristalina, so much work to do, and so very few women to do it.' The

World Bank Group of today looks nothing like the one I first joined.

We have embraced the idea that diversity makes us better, and that has changed the way we do business and make decisions. We put into place targets to make sure that our leadership team is gender-equal, and in the World Bank, we have met that goal ahead of schedule. We need to do even more to have a strong pipeline of qualified women (and men) to step up in the future. I have come to wholeheartedly embrace the need to push for gender equality, after many decades believing that we had to be gender blind: that you are either good or not. I recognized maybe a bit late that if we leave this issue to solve itself, it would take hundreds of years for men and women to be equal. As a world, we need to do three things to enable women's leadership: make sure that every girl, everywhere can have a quality education; empower girls and boys equally to speak up and be heard; and equalize society's expectations and aspirations for girls and boys so that they can grow up to be anything that they want to be. The Women Leaders Global Forum provides an opportunity for women to come together and learn from each other on how to take this important agenda forward.

Over 1,500 #Girl2Leader Delegates celebrate International Day of the Girl on five continents.
