On March 8, people celebrate the the role of women and their achievements. To mark celebrations worldwide, WPL supported the initiative launched by the International Women's Day (IWD) 2019 #BalanceforBetter asking women politicians to answer the question "What does a world with balance between women and men look like to you?" while striking the official IWD 2019 pose. WPL received an avalanche of contributions. An extremely broad variety of thoughts, views and pictures was shared by women politicians from over 40 countries. They initiated a conversation on the right of women to lead in politics, on visions for a world characterised by a more balanced presence of women in politics.

Some of the politicians responding to our call imagine a world where a better balance brings long-lasting peace; for others a balanced world is a synonym for equal opportunities and access to resources for both men and women, as well as of freedom, and for a world which is smarter, richer and more prosperous. Some go all the way to say that a word without balance is a dead world. All state the need for balance and provide clear ways forward for such vision to become a reality.

#### What is H. E. Marie Louise Coleiro Preca's Vision of a Balanced World?

#### Rebuilding Trust in Leadership: WPL at the UN Commission on the Status of Women



"We are all role models" said Juliane Bogner-Strauß, Federal Minister for Women, Families and Youth of Austria stressing the important role that women politicians play in empowering other women to achieve a higher female participation in all sectors. "An important step is to get young women on board", continued Minister Bogner-Strauß, highlighting the importance of new generations of female leaders to rebuild trust in leadership. This was the incipit of the event co-hosted by WPL and EY on the occasion of the UN Commission on the Status of Women, on March 11 in New York City.

The panel discussion addressed the importance of rebuilding trust in a world where distrust in traditional forms of leadership is spreading. Panelists agree that there is a will to change the way leadership has been perceived so far and shared suggestions to achieve this goal. One of the core drivers is for young people to be encouraged to play a crucial role in restoring confidence in leadership. In fact, numbers show that young women are less likely to join political parties or run for office, pointing to a clear lack of confidence in institutions by young people.

Kris Pederson, Americas Advisory Corporate Governance Leader at EY and co-host of the event, rounded the reflections sharing experiences from the corporate world where employees demand to work for purposeful businesses and customers opt for goods and services produced by purposeful businesses. This new way of perceiving leadership as being lead by a purpose for the benefit of society as a whole, is an element which shall contribute to the re-design of the concept of leadership.

The Q&A session which followed was moderated by Hanna Birna Kristjánsdóttir, Chair of the Executive Board of WPL, and offered an opportunity for the many participants to contribute to the discussions.

#### The Reykjavik Index and the Role of Evidence in Today's Society



<u>The Reykjavik Index for Leadership</u> was created by WPL and Kantar to support the journey to equality for women and for men. The first of its kind, the Index measures how people feel about women in leadership, assessing the perceived legitimacy of female and male leadership across 20 economic sectors and giving insight into how the views of women and men differ.

Named #BestofDavos by the World Economic Forum, the Index was recently highlighted on the OECD official blog, as part of the of the Forum Network series on <u>New Societal Contract</u>.

Leadership and Participation in International Affairs: Discussion at the Munich Security Conference 2019



Complex geo-political defence issues require a high degree of cognitive diversity in order to be properly tackled, and greater gender parity in defence and policing cannot be simply driven by fairness or altruism. Within this framework, WPL and McKinsey & Company, addressed the questions of how leadership should be defined, what type of leadership is needed and what role women play in today's international environment, on the occasion of this year's Munich Security Conference. The roundtable "A Man's World? Leadership and Participation in International Affairs" relied on speakers of the caliber of João Gomes Cravinho, Minister of National Defence of Portugal, Catherine de Bolle, Executive Director at Europol, Jacquelline Fuller, Vice President at Google, and Richard Sezibera, Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Rwanda.

Speakers tackled the question from four perspectives: low participation of women in defence and security is not a luxury that our society can afford; proofs of the benefits of female participation have been deliberated and it is now time for action; stereotypes should be fought and certain leadership styles should not be attributed 'male' or 'female' qualities; and the challenges facing defence and security are broad when it comes to gender parity and call for systemic changes.

Trust is the foundation of every meaningful interaction between humans. Right now, trust is at a breaking point, as UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres pointed out at the UN General Assembly in September 2018. We should not forget to bring young generations along to speed up the creation of a world where balance between women and men is the norm.
